



Community-Based Options for People with Disabilities in Intermediate Care Facilities

Did you know that around 99% of Ohioans who choose to move out of their Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) and into the community are happy with that decision?¹

Disability Rights Ohio (DRO) wants everyone to have the opportunity to make that choice. To that end, DRO is planning virtual visits to several ICFs. We want to talk with ICF residents about opportunities to live and receive services and supports in their own home in the community.

The settlement agreement approved last year in the *Ball v. DeWine* class action lawsuit expanded these opportunities, including an increase in the number of state-funded Individual Options waivers available to people living in an ICF who want to live in the community. DRO filed that lawsuit on behalf of ICF residents and others who lacked the chance to make meaningful and informed choices about where they lived.

DRO remains committed to helping people with disabilities who want to live in the community get access to the services and supports that allow them to do so. As such, DRO will use the upcoming ICF visits to²:

- **Learn** about ICF residents' interests, needs, and preferences;
- **Connect** interested residents with others who have transitioned from facilities to the community;
- **Offer information about opportunities** to visit community settings in person (or by video);
- **Increase awareness** of available waiver slots and types of home and community-based services;
- **Support individuals**, their families, and their guardians in making an informed choice about where those individuals prefer to live and received services.
