WHAT INFORMATION OR DOCUMENTS DO I NEED TO VOTE IN PERSON?

In-Person Voting

To vote in-person during early voting or on Election Day, you will need to show a poll worker a form of current identification to show who you are.

Current means within the last 12 months for utility bills, bank statements, government checks, paychecks, and other government documents.

What documents can I use as identification for voting?

Acceptable Identification includes any of the following:

- An unexpired Ohio driver's license or state identification card with your present address. It's okay if your Ohio driver's license/state ID has your former address as long as your current address is printed in the official list of registered voters for that precinct;
- Another type of unexpired photo identification issued by the United States government or the State of Ohio, that contains your name, current address, and your photograph;
- A military identification;
- A current utility bill with your name and present address (can be a cell phone bill);
- A current bank statement with your name and present address;
- A current government check with your name and present address;
- A current paycheck with your name and present address; or
- A current other government document (other than a notice of voter registration mailed by a board of elections) that shows your name and present address.

What if I don't have my ID with me when I go to vote in-person?

You can still cast a **provisional ballot** by giving a poll worker:

- Your Ohio driver's license or state identification number, or
- The last four digits of your Social Security number.

A provisional ballot is a ballot that must be checked by the Board of Elections to make sure you have the right to vote. You may have to provide your ID to the Board of Elections within a certain amount of time in order for your vote to be counted.
